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The portrayal of Non-heterosexuality in Indian Cinema: A Journey with the Gender Lens

In the global discourse, Sexuality has achieved great value since the 70's of the previous century at least. Though it is usual to talk about the interconnection between sex and gender in the hard-core academia. The tendency to trim it down to a mere sexual activity, as an expression of 'Desire' however still survives in the social sphere.
